# 20th Anniversary of September 11th Reminds Us of the Need for Unity

In the early morning hours of September 11, 2021, Mayfield Village held a ceremony at the First Responders Memorial to commemorate the events of 20 years ago when America suffered a horrific terrorist attack. I had the honor of speaking at the ceremony and wanted to share my comments with you here.

As I was preparing my comments for this morning, the song, The Way We Were, by Barbra Streisand, kept coming back to me. In the song, Barbra reminisces about simpler times in the past, and she reminds us that, sometimes when we look back, what's too painful to remember, we simply choose to forget.

Today, **by choice**, we gather here at our First Responders Memorial to **remember** a painful and horrific event in our history. While it might be easier to ignore what happened on September 11, 2001, we recognize that the events of that tragic day marked our lives forever, and that despite the atrocities that were foisted on us, we came together as Americans and as neighbors to heal and to rebuild. And so, I am thankful to all of you who come together today to remember, to respect, and to unite as Americans.

About 40 years ago, when I was in college, I visited NYC and viewed the Manhattan skyline from the top of the World Trade Center. There, perched at what felt like the top of the world, outlines of the surrounding skyscrapers were traced on the glass walls, so that you could match up the actual buildings within the lines on the glass and determine what you

were looking at. It was a dizzying and somewhat scary experience for me. But I never imagined that, 20 years later, the World Trade Center towers would be the sight of a very different dizzying and scary experience, and that, on September 11, 2001, there would be no more pairing glass with skyscrapers at the top of the world. Instead, I would be pairing my left hand with my right to pray for victims, for families, and for this great Nation.

On September 11, 2001, four United States commercial airliners were hijacked in the most massive foreign terrorist attack on American soil. At 8:45 AM on that Tuesday morning, an American Airlines jet crashed in to the 80<sup>th</sup> floor of north Tower of the World Trade Center, instantly killing hundreds and trapping hundreds more on the floors above the crash site. Eighteen minutes later, as evacuation efforts of both towers were getting underway, a United Airlines jet crashed into the 60<sup>th</sup> floor of the south tower, causing a second explosion and sending dust, shards of glass, metal fragments, burning debris and mountains of paper to the ground below. An eyewitness described the scene as a "surreal" -a "graveyard filled with paper."

In Washington DC, an American Airlines flight circled downtown before crashing into the Pentagon in Arlington, VA, killing 189 people. A hijack attempt on a fourth plane, its destination unknown, was foiled by a small group of brave passengers, and crashed into a quiet field in Shanksville, Pennsylvania, killing all 44 aboard.

America was under attack;

Our democracy was challenged; and

Our faith was tested.

As we struggled to comprehend a senseless attack on our citizens, our first responders -- police, firefighters and paramedics --mobilized immediately, navigating toward the horrific scenes against a growing throng of pedestrians trying to escape the horror.

While we stood grief-stricken and in shock, first responders rushed into burning buildings and collapsing skyscrapers, calmly guiding evacuations and carrying victims to safety.

And as we gathered to regroup, and to pray for the victims, their families and our country, first responders provided answers to our prayers, fighting fatigue, smoke and flames, collapsing structures and melting steel, to help victims escape from hell on earth, often sacrificing their own lives in the process.

But in those moments of pain, fear and destruction, we were reminded that our strength was never encased in steel and concrete. President Bush stated in his address to the Nation that evening, "Terrorist attacks can shake the foundations of our biggest buildings, but they cannot touch the foundation of America. These acts shatter steel, but they cannot dent the steel of American resolve."

This morning, on the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of 9/11, and in this place of peace and remembrance, we gather to mourn the lives tragically taken from us in terrorist attacks, we honor the first responders of 9/11 and we honor and thank all of our first responders, especially those who protect and assist in our own community. To Police Chief Paul Matias, Fire Chief Eugene Carcioppolo, and to all of the fine men and women who serve and have served in the Mayfield Village police and fire departments and other local departments, know that you have our deepest respect and our constant gratitude.

Today's memorial ceremony is a solemn occasion. But just as we choose to grieve the losses and honor the heroes of 9/11, we also choose to remember that America rose out of the flames and ashes with a renewed unity, strength and resolve.

As we have recently witnessed, America and Americans remain the target of terrorist attacks. So then, we must go forward together, united not just in our grief, but in our resolve to work together as a united front against our common enemy of terrorism, just as we did 20 years ago. May God bless the United States of America and may He bless all of you.

Wishing you all a joyful holiday season!

## **Police Chief Paul Matias Among Hall of Fame Honorees**

On October 6, 2021, Paul Matias, who has served as Mayfield Village's Chief of Police since 2019, was inducted into the Mayfield High School Hall of Fame.

Chief Matias was one of five honorees that evening. He stated that he always considered himself an average student while at Mayfield High School, but his ambition grew as he then graduated from Lakeland Community College, earned a Master of Science degree from Tiffin University and served 10 years in the United States Navy. Chief Matias stated that he realized years later that he had gained a distinct advantage from his years at Mayfield High School. He credits the school staff for "working harder to get him through high school than he

did on his own." He particularly credits the electronics and robotics program for spurring his desire to excel.

Chief Matias says that being able to use his training, education and experience to serve the Mayfield community is among his greatest achievements.

Attendance at this year's induction ceremony was limited due to Covid restrictions, but Mayor Bodnar was able to attend. Along with Council, Department Heads, and Staff, Mayor Bodnar congratulates Chief Matias and the other inductees on this achievement. "Folks in Mayfield Village already know that Chief Matias is awesome and we are glad that others also recognize his contribution to our community."

# Yard Waste Polluting Our Waterways

Did you know that grass and leaves can harm our creeks and streams?







Examples of Illegal dumping of grass clippings that will enter the stream in the next rain event.

Algae bloom caused by excess nutrients as grass and leaf material breaks down.

Few, if any, property owners think it's acceptable to dump tires, machine parts, plastics and other unnatural trash into our waterways, but many still believe it's okay to deposit organic material like leaves and grass onto a streambank, in a storm drain, or into the stream itself. Well, when it comes to stream dumping, even organic doesn't "cut it."

Many leaves will naturally fall into the water but, as homeowners, we should be mindful not to upset nature's balance. Leaves, grass clippings and pet waste should never be dumped in or even next to a storm drain, creek, ditch or pond.

# **Ward 4 Neighborhood Update**

I have a feeling that many of us are tired of the pandemic being a reason for things not getting done. In regards to the Ward 4 neighborhood, I wanted to provide you with an update on activities that were identified pre-pandemic and have continued moving forward during it.

Worton Park Flooding – Mayfield Village has been working for the last several years with the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District (NEORSD) to monitor storm water levels in the Worton Park neighborhood and develop a comprehensive plan to address flooding issues there. NEORSD has completed its review and has made several recommendations for improvements. A preliminary meeting with residents was held on June 30, 2021 (all materials provided at the meeting are on the Village's website and updates will be posted there going forward).

First of all, the project now has an official name - the Worton Park Culvert Project – which is being scheduled to begin in Fall 2022 and was presented as two distinct phases. In summary:

- Phase I includes replacing and widening two culverts in the Worton Park neighborhood, with channel improvement work to be done between the two new culverts. One of the culverts is located on Worton Park Drive near Hemingway Road, and the other is on North Woodlane Drive. \$1.2 million has been budgeted to complete Phase I with the entire project expected to take approximately 90 days, dependent upon weather.
- Phase II (replacement of the remaining three culverts) is being planned for 2023.

A second neighborhood meeting is being planned to provide residents with specific details on scheduling, traffic management and to follow-up the questions and concerns from the June 30<sup>th</sup> meeting. Progress is being made! Please check the Village website for more details and information as it becomes available.

**Fiber Network for Residents** – during the peak of the pandemic, with more people working from home and students going to school online, the need for fast, reliable internet connectivity became apparent and concerning for residents in Ward 4 and across the Village.

As background, in the early 2000s, the Village installed a fiber ring on Beta Drive. It was installed as an economic development tool and much of the installation cost of \$350,000 was covered by Cuyahoga County. It's how Beta Drive received its designation as an "Innovation Zone." The hope was that more high-tech businesses would come to the Village to take advantage of the high-speed, low-cost, fiber, unfortunately, this has not occurred in the intervening years.

Fast forward to 2020-21, and many have asked if the Village has plans or has ever considered a *residential* fiber network? This led to questions about where to begin, how would it work, and is there really enough interest for it?

Mayor Bodnar's Administration decided to reach out to other cities that have embarked on this type of initiative and found that Fairlawn Ohio, outside of Akron, has an up and running residential and commercial fiber network since 2016. To explore their situation in depth, a Zoom meeting was ar-

ranged between Fairlawn and representatives from the Village's Administration and Council to find out why, what, and how they did it. Here is a summary of the financial highlights and considerations:

- The cost to install the "FairlawnGig" broadband utility in Fairlawn was roughly \$10 million which included 55 miles of fiber and one data center at \$2.8 million. Fairlawn has approximately 1,600 homes and spans five square miles. Mayfield Village has 21 centerline miles, approximately 1,300 homes and spans less than 4 square miles. Therefore, Mayfield Village could anticipate a similar installation cost, less the fiber that already exists on Beta Drive.
- FairlawnGig currently charges \$75/month for 1000 mbps of service to residents and \$500/month to businesses (more than the current cost being charged to businesses on Beta Drive). The residential side of FairlawnGig has grown slowly, but the commercial side more than makes up for it. Fairlawn currently has 325 commercial buildings utilizing the service. Given the number of businesses in the Village that are not located on Beta Drive (62 total), the Village cannot anticipate having anything close to that kind of commercial participation, even after running the fiber through the center of town. The majority of the revenue, if a broadband utility were installed in the Village, would need to be derived from residential service. meaning that residents would have to pay substantially more than \$75 for monthly service.
- Fairlawn indicated that the installation of FairlawnGig has had a positive impact on home values there. Over the last three years, home values in Fairlawn increased by 8% per year, compared to 3% in surrounding communities. While installing the utility has likely had positive impact, it is important to remember that from 2018 to 2019, the median price for single-family

homes increased by 6% across Cuyahoga County. In Mayfield Village, home values increased by 22% during that same period. Given the overall strength of the real estate market these past years, it is not clear that the increase in home values in Fairlawn can be directly attributed to the installation of the utility.

After considering the high cost of installing the infrastructure, the added cost of personnel to run the utility, not having a sufficient business base to support the cost of residential service, and not knowing how much residents would be willing to pay to purchase the service, all involved agreed that it did not make sense to pursue installing residential broadband at this time.

All this being said, if there is still interest in Mayfield Village investing in a residential broadband network, let me hear from you. I would be interested to know how much residents would be willing to pay for monthly broadband service.



# Mayfield Village Police Speed Photo Enforcement Key Points

As you might imagine, I have received many emails and calls following the Village's approval of a Speed Photo Enforcement Program. Most of the less positive messages have come from people outside of the Village. Those from Village residents have been very supportive of the program, with many saying that they feel that "something needs to be done."

I have done all I can to explain the program, how and when we intend to utilize the cameras, and our desire to make I-271 safer for motorists and police officers. Please take a moment to review these key points:

- In late 2020 we began to notice a significant increase in vehicles travelling at high speeds. The ODOT traffic monitor on I-271 north of Highland Road shows an over 100% increase in the number of vehicles travelling 85mph or above.
- In 2021 we began traffic details on I-271. Due to high volumes during rush hour and high speeds, it is very dangerous to motorist and Officers to conduct traffic stops during rush hour.
- We believe photo enforcement will act as a deterrent to slow drivers down.
- WE ARE NOT INSTALLING FIXED CAMERAS. Photo enforcement will be conducted by a Police Officer using a laser with a camera. It is the same operation we do now for traffic Enforcement, we are just using technology to remove the dangerous traffic stop on a busy freeway.
- WE WILL NOT BE SENDING PHOTO TICKETS TO PEOPLE DRIVING A FEW
  MILES OVER THE LIMIT. We are targeting cars driving at dangerous and reckless speeds. The ODOT monitor shows many cars regularly travelling over 100
  mph. If we wouldn't stop you during our traditional enforcement, we will not
  send you a photo ticket.
- WE ARE ONLY USING THE PHOTO ENFORMENT DURING MORNING AND EVENING RUSH HOUR ON I-271. We are still doing traditional traffic enforcement during the day, at night, and on weekends and holidays. If our primary intent was to generate revenue, we would use the photo enforcement much more aggressively, especially on the weekends.

Members are provided with a code to deposit scraps in locked bins at their convenience. With enough local participation, weekly home pickup could also be available for an additional fee.

We all have them—food scraps from dinner, food that we didn't get around to eating, food that we don't want to put down the disposal. According to the US Environmental Protection Agency, food is the single largest category of material placed in municipal landfills, where it emits methane, a powerful greenhouse gas. Over 40% of all food in the United States ends up in landfills, exacerbating climate change.

Since 2014, Rust Belt Riders has been working with people and organizations across Northeast Ohio to provide them with an alternative to landfills for their food waste. By diverting food from landfills, Rust Belt Riders support our local food system through the creation of value-added agricultural products (Tilth Soil) sold and donated to local farms, community gardens and garden centers.

Community Drop-Off locations are becoming popular in the area and Mayfield Village would like to establish one in our community in the coming months. We need 40 participants to move forward, so *please* let us know if you would like to become a member.

# Mayfield Village Dispatch Center – "The Calm Voice in the Dark Night"

Few persons in the public safety world make as many daily and important impressions as the Public Safety Dispatcher. They receive calls that may range in scope from simple directions to providing life-saving information. They may be required to calm a distraught person whose child is choking, attempt to stop a person from committing suicide or dispatch police, fire, and EMS in the span of a few seconds.

Public Safety Dispatchers must be proficient at multi-tasking and possess many technical skills. They undergo a great deal of specialized training and must be capable of keeping their emotions under control during emergencies. Along with answering calls, they are the first person to greet you when you visit the Police Station. Mayfield Village has an excellent Public Safety Communications Center staffed by some of the most experienced

and well-trained Dispatchers in the area.

Here is some important information all residents should know:

911 Calls. When you call 911 from a landline phone, the call goes directly to the Mayfield Village Dispatch Center and includes the address you are calling from. You can also reach the Dispatch Center by calling the non-emergency line at (440) 461-1234. If you call 911 from a mobile device, the call is answered by an operator at the Cuyahoga County Emergency Communication Center. Once they establish your location, they forward the call to the Mayfield Village Dispatch Center.

During times of high call volume, Cuyahoga County

















may take some time to answer your call or may put you on hold. If this occurs, you may call the Mayfield Village Dispatch Center directly by using the non-emergency number, call 911 from a landline, or use the Your911 app. Always be prepared to provide detailed information on your location and type of emergency. The Your911 app is also used to send out emergency notifications or other information from the Police and Fire Departments. Please check our website or call for information on the Your911 app.

**Power Outages.** During power outages, the Police Department's emergency call volume increases dramatically. If you have an emergency during

a power outage, of course, please call us. However, to report a power outage, please contact the Illuminating Company at 1-888-LIGHTSS (1-888-544-4877), report the outage online, or text REG to 544487 (LIGHTS).

If you are calling the Police Department only to inquire when the power will be restored, just like you, we do not know. When this is done, it prevents our dispatchers from answering calls with emergencies pending. You may call the Illuminating Company or check their website from a mobile device during a power outage to get an estimate of when the power will be restored. We do not know when you will get your power back.

**Ralph Tarsitano** submitted his photograph titled "Star-Gazing."







**Snow Plow Trucks.** The Service Department does it's best to make sure all roads are cleared in a timely manner. Please give adequate space between your vehicle and the plow equipment.

Snow should not be deposited in the street by contractors or homeowners when clearing your driveway.

**Mailboxes.** Aging posts become weak and break easily. Please inspect your mailbox post and make sure the box is secured to its base.

#### **Winterizing Your Home:**

- Have rock salt on hand to treat slippery surfaces.
- Have a professional inspect your furnace and replace or clean filters as needed.
- If using a fireplace, have a professional inspect your chimney.
- Seal drafty doors and windows.
- Shut off and drain outside water supply lines to avoid frozen lines.


