# **Your Lyndhurst Municipal Court Update**

#### SLOW DOWN!

During the pandemic, area police departments greatly reduced traffic enforcement in an effort to minimize interaction with the public and slow the spread of the coronavirus. However, area police departments have been gradually increasing traffic enforcement and the number of traffic citations filed with the Court in 2023 are nearing pre-pandemic numbers. While I truly enjoy interacting with my fellow Hillcrest area residents, I prefer to do so outside of the courthouse. So please watch your speed!

In addition to normal traffic enforcement, Mayfield Village and Gates Mills are utilizing traffic cameras to assist in speed enforcement. Mayfield Village started its traffic camera program in January 2022. Mayfield Village utilizes traffic cameras on its stretch of I-271 during morning and afternoon rush hours, Monday through Friday. Fines start at \$150 (up to 19 mph over the speed limit) and go as high as \$300 (driving 30 mph or more above the speed limit).

The Village of Gates Mills initiated its traffic camera program this August. Gates Mills is utilizing stationary cameras east-bound and westbound on Mayfield Road. The eastbound camera is located east of West Hill Drive as drivers approach Chagrin River Road. The westbound camera is located just east of Fox Hill Drive as drivers approach Chagrin River Road. Signs are posted notifying drivers that photo enforcement is in use. Fines start at \$135 (between 10 and 19 mph over the speed limit) and go as high as \$300 (driving 30 mph or more above the speed

limit). Gates Mills operates its traffic camera program 24 hours a day.

Traffic enforcement speed cameras are permitted in the State of Ohio. If you receive a traffic camera ticket issued by either Gates Mills or Mayfield Village, you can contest the ticket through the Lyndhurst Municipal Court. Check the back of the ticket or the Court's website (www.lyndhurstmunicipalcourt.org) for directions on how to contest your ticket. No one likes receiving a traffic camera ticket in the mail, so please be mindful of your speed.

#### PROTECT YOURSELF FROM FRAUD

Local police departments have been investigating an increasing number of fraud complaints related to checks that were altered after being mailed. Individuals are realizing that the check they mailed to pay a utility bill, for example, was altered by changing the payee and the amount on the check. While these victims are typically made whole by their bank, the ordeal is stressful, frustrating, and time consuming. Please consider taking steps to protect yourself from this type of fraud by paying more bills electronically and closely monitoring your bank accounts.

#### **LOCK YOUR CAR DOORS**

Local police departments continue to investigate reports of stolen cars and car break-ins right from the owner's driveway during the overnight hours. Please lock your vehicles and keep nothing of value in them.

# **School Bus Safety Law**

It is important to remember to drive safely around our school busses. Below is the Village's Codified School Bus Law and a visual aid describing when a motorist must stop.

#### 331.38 STOPPING FOR SCHOOL BUS; DIS-CHARGING CHILDREN.

(a) The driver of a vehicle upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school child, person attending programs offered by community boards of mental health and County boards of developmental disabilities, or child attending a program offered by a head start agency, shall stop at least ten feet from the front or rear of the school bus and shall not proceed until such school bus resumes motion, or until signaled by the school bus driver to proceed.

It is no defense to a charge under this subsection (a) hereof that the school bus involved failed to display or be equipped with an automatically extended stop warning sign as required by subsection (b) hereof.

- (b) Every school bus shall be equipped with amber and red visual signals meeting the requirements of Ohio R.C. 4511.771, and an automatically extended stop warning sign of a type approved by the State Board of Education, which shall be actuated by the driver of the bus whenever but only whenever the bus is stopped or stopping on the roadway for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children....
- (c) Where a highway has been divided into four or more traffic lanes, a driver of a vehicle need not stop for a school bus approaching from the opposite direction which has stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school child.... The driver of any vehicle overtaking the school bus shall comply with subsection (a) hereof.



(d) School buses operating on divided highways or on highways with four or more traffic lanes shall receive and discharge all school children...on their residence side of the highway.






(e) No school bus driver shall start the driver's bus until after any child...who may have alighted therefrom has reached a place of safety on the child or person's residence side of the road.

#### When to stop for a school bus in Ohio


On a road with fewer than four lanes, all traffic approaching a stopped school bus from either direction must stop at least 10 feet from the front or rear of the bus and remain stopped until the bus begins to move or the bus driver signals motorists to proceed.





TWO-LANE HIGHWAY WITH CENTER TURN LANE

If the bus is stopped on a street with four or more lanes, only traffic proceeding in the same direction as the bus must stop.





FOUR-LANE HIGHWAY WITH CENTER TURN LANE

Failure to stop for a school bus adds 2 points to your license in Ohio and is punishable by fines up to \$500. You must appear in court and the judge has the discretion to suspend your driver's license for up to one year. A driver who injures a pedestrian while failing to comply with school bus safety laws can face both criminal charges and civil liability. Those liabilities can include the victim's medical expenses, lost wages, rehabilitation, and non-economic damages, such as pain and suffering.

# **Contractor Registration Protects Residents**

From time to time, I am routed legal guestions via the Village's Building Department about construction projects, usually residential remodeling, that have developed problems. In almost every project that has gone wrong, I discover that the contractor was not registered with the Village. That is why I wanted to take this opportunity to speak to the community about the importance of ensuring that certain contractors hired to perform work at or in your property are properly registered with the Village through obtaining a certificate of registration from the Village's Building Commissioner. This is required by Mayfield Village Codified Ordinance Chapter 1313. While some might find such a law as overkill, this requirement is there to protect all property owners!

Pursuant to Chapter 1313, a contractor or tradesman providing services in any of the following areas must obtain a certificate of registration from the Building Commissioner prior to commencing any work in the Village: general contracting, carpentry, roofing, plumbing, electrical, piping, sewers, hearing, air conditioning, refrigeration, concrete or asphalt paving, snow plow, landscaper, and/or masonry. Should any contractor or tradesman perform any of the above without first registering with the Village, an offender faces a maximum penalty of not more than \$500.00 (each day on which a violation occurs) or up to six months of imprisonment.

As the Prosecutor, I can also choose whether to pursue criminal action against a contracting company, or the individual who controls the day to day affairs of the company. Addtionally, as mentioned above, I

can charge the contractor with multiple criminal charges for each day the contractor did work while unregistered.

While these penalties are against the contractor/tradesman and not the property owner, it is still vitally important that a property owner requires that work to be performed is done so by a properly registered contractor/tradesman.

Why does this matter to a property owner? Ensuring that a contractor/tradesman has appropriately registered with the Village provides peace-of-mind that the contractor/tradesman has a valid certificate of insurance for bodily injury and property damages. Such liability insurance must be in amounts of at least \$1,000,000.00 in a combined single limit for personal injury or death, and for damage to property caused by work authorized under the building permit. Hiring a contractor/tradesman that has not registered with the Village leaves a property owner susceptible to having to fix damage or be liable for injuries caused by a contractor or its employees, with limited legal recourse.

Please remember that, depending on the work to be performed, whether it is the homeowner themselves or a contractor/tradesman performing the work, the work shall be subject to all provisions of the Village's Building Code. This includes such requirements as permitting and inspections. Prior to beginning any project, be sure to look into what requirements are included in the Building Code.

• State legislators can also propose constitutional amendments, which is how Issue 1 came about. The Ohio House of Representatives and Senate approved a resolution in May that put Issue 1 on the ballot in August. If Issue 1 passes, future constitutional amendments proposed by legislators would still only require 50% of the vote to pass. [CORRECTION: If approved, proposed amendments by the General Assembly would have required a 60% vote of electors to pass.]

In short, you don't just have your fingers on the pulse of Mayfield Village. You are the pulse of Mayfield Village.



Unfortunately when Covid came along the local Regional Bowling Tournament was cancelled and it has not returned. Our basketball and athletics teams are still going strong! The Cuyahoga-Mayfield delegation is comprised of approximately fifty athletes, one head coach, volunteers, one parent coordinator and one local coordinator. I have the privilege of working with

He is genuinely interested in the status of our individuals/teams, how the season is going and has even offered to help coach when needed. Mayfield Village Resident Troy Koch is our parent coordinator; a role which receives very little attention but deserves tremendous appreciation. Troy gathers information between coach, athletes and their family members, the local coordinator and then filters through it to relay appropriate information to the correct parties. He is absolutely the go-to guy of the team. I would certainly be lost without him because I am the local coordinator for the Cuyahoga-Mayfield delegation. I send/receive information from Special Olympics Ohio and run it by Coach, Troy (and often Shane) before passing it on to the necessary parties. We also have several local organizations and civic groups that contribute donations to our teams. All of us as individuals play an essential role in making sure that all the moving parts keep things running smoothly for these teams!

I have assisted our Cuyahoga-Mayfield Track/Field team at the Summer State Games in Columbus several times. I have helped at local/regional track meets and I have attended many basketball games to support our team. I was even at the State Basketball Tournament in 2020 when Cuyahoga-Mayfield took Fourth Place! These are all experiences that I am so thankful for. I wanted to leave you with one last piece that I came across from Special Olympics Ohio. I believe this gem embodies what Special Olympics strives for and what I'm proud to be a part of. It's about the individual. It's about their different abilities and skills. It's about recognizing individual effort. On the Special Olympics Ohio website it says: "Athletes in every sport and event are grouped by age, gender, and ability – giving everyone a reasonable chance to win. At Special Olympics there are no World Records because each athlete, whether in the fastest or the slowest division is valued and rec-

ognized equally. In every division, all athletes receive an award, from gold, silver, and bronze medals, to fourth through eighth place ribbons. All athletes are given an equal chance to participate, perform, and be recognized for doing their best by their teammates, family, friends, and fans."

I personally have held the hand of an athlete who has been unsure of what to do and I have held the hand of an athlete not confident in their own ability. I have chased after an athlete running from a venue in order to ensure his safety; to encourage him to participate in the sport that he excels at; to remind him that he is capable of giving his best effort. I witnessed a smile from one of our athletes who rarely conveys emotion. I am grateful to be part of these moments and I am thrilled to be part of our Cuyahoga -Mayfield team.

# Service Department Fall Reminders

Service personnel collect leaves on all residential streets in Mayfield Village each Fall. There is no Spring pick-up.

- The Village begins pick-up in mid-October and ends in mid-December, dependent on the weather. Please don't wait until the end of the season to bring your leaves to the curb. Once it begins to snow consistently, Service will not be able to pick up leaves.
- Leaves must be raked to the tree lawn, no more than 6 feet from the curb. Please make sure there are no branches or other debris mixed in the with leaves because they can clog and damage the leaf machines. Branches should be placed in a separate pile.
- Do not rake leaves into the street as they can clog the street sewers, causing roadway flooding.
- Do not rakes leaves up against your mailbox post or near street signs as it is difficult to get the leaf machine in those areas. Try to keep leaf piles 4 ft. away from any obstruction.
- Please do not call for a special pick-up. The Service Department follows a specific route in order to ensure that leaves on all streets are picked up routinely and equally.



# **Fall Fire Safety Reminders**

Happy Fall from all of us at the Mayfield Village Fire Department. Fall represents a great time to enjoy the outdoors and spend time with friends and family. October 8 thru 14 was the National Fire Protection Association's Fire Prevention Week and cooking safety was addressed. Be safe and follow all these Fall reminders.





- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Maintain a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried
- Keep anything that can catch fire—oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains—away from your stovetop. If you have a small (grease) cooking fire and decide to fight the fire...
- On the stovetop, smother the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled.
- For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed. If you have any doubt about fighting a small fire...
- Just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire.
- Call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number from outside the home.

Transitioning from the warmer months to the cooler weather is a good time to have your home HVAC system and any other fuel fired appliances (stove, cooktop, water heater, dryers, etc.) serviced by a licensed technician to ensure they are operating appropriately.

It will help reduce the chances of a fire or the emission of Carbon Monoxide, and it may help reduce your consumption of fuel to operate your home heating appliance ultimately saving you money. Even if you have an electric home heating appliance, is still appropriate to have it serviced to ensure it is operating appropriately.

It is also a great time to have your chimney cleaned to ensure that your flue is not in appropriate condition to have a fire. The build up of creosote in your chimney can limit the evacuation of smoke and if left too long can ignite and support combustion in the chimney flue which can heat the masonry chim-

ney and extend into the rest of your home.

Moving into winter, please ensure that you have working smoke alarms and carbon monoxide

alarms. Remember to replace the batteries when you change your clocks in accordance with daylight savings time. When you change your batteries, it is also a good time to determine the age of your alarms. Smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms have a definitive lifespan, with smoke alarms being 10 years from the date of manufacturing and carbon monoxide alarms being 5-7 years from the date of manufacturing. The date of manufacturing can be found on the



back of the alarm.

The 2022 National Fire Protection Association fire safety week slogan was: Fire won't wait. You're your escape. Reviewing your home escape plan while the weather is still mild is a great idea, and all occupants of the home should practice and understand the concept of the home escape plan. Talking through the two ways out of each occupied space in the home, where the common meeting place is outside, and never returning into the home after evacuating. Practicing evacuating and meeting at the common meeting place should be done during the day and at night to help the tenants of your home understand the challenges associate with limited or no light. The above listed items are not all encompassing, but are being presented, to begin the discussion at your home to cover the basic concepts of emergency fire planning in your home.

# **Monarch Butterfly Migration**

Monarch butterflies will soon be migrating south across our state. Many folks know that planting milkweed for monarchs is important, and we, of course, encourage planting native milkweed species where you can. Monarch butterflies lay their eggs on milkweed so that their caterpillars have a ready food source when they emerge. Eating milkweed leaves makes the caterpillars toxic to birds, a stealthy defense strategy.

But what do they need once that caterpillar transforms into a chrysalis, and ultimately an adult butterfly themselves? Adult monarch butterflies are not eating milkweed leaves, but instead are collecting nectar from a variety of native wildflowers. If you'd like to support the entire monarch lifecycle, you can plant a diversity of native wildflowers that includes some late blooming species to fuel them for migration.

#### Fall blooms for migration:

Common boneset (*Eupatorium perfoliatum*)
Ironweed (*Veronia fasciculata*)
White snakeroot (*Eupatorium rugosum*)
New England aster (*Aster novae-angliae*)
Showy goldenrod (*Solidago speciosa*)
Tall coreopsis (*Coreopsis tripteris*)
Blue mistflower (*Conoclinium coelestinum*)



Fire and Police representatives went over and discussed emergency procedures to help ensure a smooth transition in an emergency.

Throughout the season, the Pool staff continued on-site in-services, CPR, First Aid, and Water rescues. Combined training with each shift of Firefighters established a sound foundation for lifeguards by practicing and knowing what to do when EMS arrived and provided a continuous standard of care. Weekly skills checks and fitness challenges kept the staff rescue-ready.


